Sausalito's History

For over 3,000 **year**, before white settlers arrived in the region of Sausalito, Native Americans, knowing as the *Coast Miwok*, occupied this area. The Miwoks were peacefully people and some of their families still live in and about Sausalito today.

Spanish sailors originally gave the town the name Saucito because of the little willow trees grow next to the river there.

The name later became Saucelito and, finally, Sausalito. With the arriving of the first European explorers in 1775 the Miwoks' quiet way of life changed forever and Sausalito grew into an important harbor.

In 1838, William Richardson, an English seaman, settled in Sausalito. He founded several of the much successful shipping supply companies in this area. But he ran into financial difficulties and must to sell most of his companies.

When the railroad came to the Pacific coast, Sausalito became a key ferry port. The Golden Gate Bridge was a blow to the ferry business and to Sausalito. In the quieter years that followed, Sausalito's beauty attracts artists and writers. With the return from passenger ferries in 1970, Sausalito became a popular tourist destination. Sausalito will always be a place with a promising future, when its luck continues.

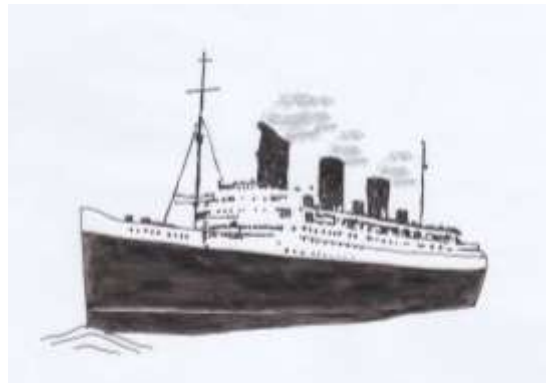

C. Reading Text

Royal Lady - the Queen Mary reigns in California

1 In 2017 the City of Long Beach, California, United States, issued a report on a royal
resident in the harbor of Long Beach which seemed to be in a very bad condition.
The endangered Royal mentioned in this report is the RMS Queen Mary, a retired
British ocean liner that had sailed mostly across the North Atlantic Ocean. The report
5 said that not only the hull but also the exhibition area within the ship were corroding, and
that the ship's condition left areas such as the engine room vulnerable to flooding. Long
Beach put US\$23 million into repairing the most necessary parts. The Queen Mary may
no longer cross the oceans. There can be no doubt that it is the most majestic ocean
liner ever built and it is, quite rightly, listed in the National Register of Historic Places.

10 When the plans for the ship were first drawn up in
the late 1920s, many people thought it would be
impossible to build. The Queen Mary was
constructed for the Cunard cruise company in the
shipyards of Scotland. It took 40 months to build
15 and cost 3.5 million Pounds Sterling to complete.
The Cunard company wanted the Queen Mary,
along with its sister ship RMS Queen Elizabeth, for the service between Southampton,
Cherbourg and New York. Able to accommodate a total of 2,139 passengers, the Queen
Mary was the flagship of the Cunard fleet from May 1936 until October 1946 when this
20 role was taken over by the Queen Elizabeth.



The Queen Mary sailed on its maiden voyage on 27 May 1936 and it made the
transatlantic crossing in just under 4 days — a world record it held for 14 years. It could
sail at a speed of about 38 knots, equivalent to a speed on land of about 58 kmph.
Following the outbreak of the Second World War, it was used by the Allied commanders
25 for transporting Australian and New Zealand soldiers, and later American soldiers,
across to the UK. For this purpose, the ship was painted navy grey. This grey
camouflage, in combination with the ship's exceptional speed, led to its wartime
nickname: the "Grey Ghost". However, it never encountered a single U-boat and was
never fired on with bullets or bombs.

30 After the war, the Queen Mary was refitted for passenger service. It had two indoor swimming pools, beauty salons, libraries and children's nurseries, a music studio and a lecture hall, outdoor tennis courts and dog kennels. The Queen Mary was one of the first ocean liners where you could telephone around the world. One of the largest rooms on board was the first-class dining room, which could seat up to 800 people. The section of
35 the ship that made up the kitchens covered an area of almost half a hectare and the first-class swimming pool covered two decks in height. In 1947, alongside its sister ship, the Queen Elizabeth, it resumed the transatlantic passenger service for which the two ships had originally been built.

After a long and distinguished career in which it crossed the Atlantic over 1,000 times,
40 the Queen Mary was officially retired from service in 1967. It left Southampton for the last time on 31 October 1967 and sailed to the port of Long Beach, California, United States, where it has remained to this day serving as an attractive sight and an event location. A lot of the machinery, three of the four propellers, and all of the boilers were removed. Most of the cabins were converted into hotel rooms and the main lounges into
45 dining rooms. On Promenade Deck, a restaurant and café named Lord Nelson's and Lady Hamilton's were built; the whole ship was decorated in the style of early 19th-century sailing ships. The elegant Observation Bar was redecorated as a western-themed bar. The original wedding chapel, which can hold up to 200 guests, was maintained. So the ship still takes its 'passengers' on a journey through history with all
50 its romance and adventure.

On 8 May 1971 the Queen Mary lowered its gangway once again. It now houses two restaurants, a hotel, a museum and offers guided tours. Many people believe that the Queen Mary is haunted, so the ship recently introduced a 'Ghosts and Legends' tour. This is an interactive, modern, special-effects attraction that blurs the line between what
55 is real and what is not, and it dramatizes actual paranormal and historic events reported over the past 60 years.

The Titanic may be the most famous ship in history, but the majestic Queen Mary is, in fact, an even bigger ship and it is still afloat! It has had a long and fascinating history. Will this be the final chapter? It is anyone's guess. But, given the good luck the 'Mary'
60 has enjoyed over the last eight decades or more, it just might have a few more surprises in store.

Jake	If you are ambitious and flexible, you can change jobs more easily here - whether you have the qualifications or not. You must remember, though, that you have to organize health insurance for yourself. Parents should also bear in mind that private schools, like my daughter's, offer expensive academic programs and so school fees here can be high.
Jim	When I moved to California, the first thing I noticed was the smog; pollution is a real problem here. On the other hand, there are some great national parks, e.g. Yosemite Park, which also make it a great place to live if you enjoy climbing.
Mary	There are some real dangers here: regular earthquakes, mudslides, forest fires and also a high risk of tsunamis along the gold coast. These facts frighten me, but the perfect surfing waves and dazzling sunshine all day long convinced me to come to live here.

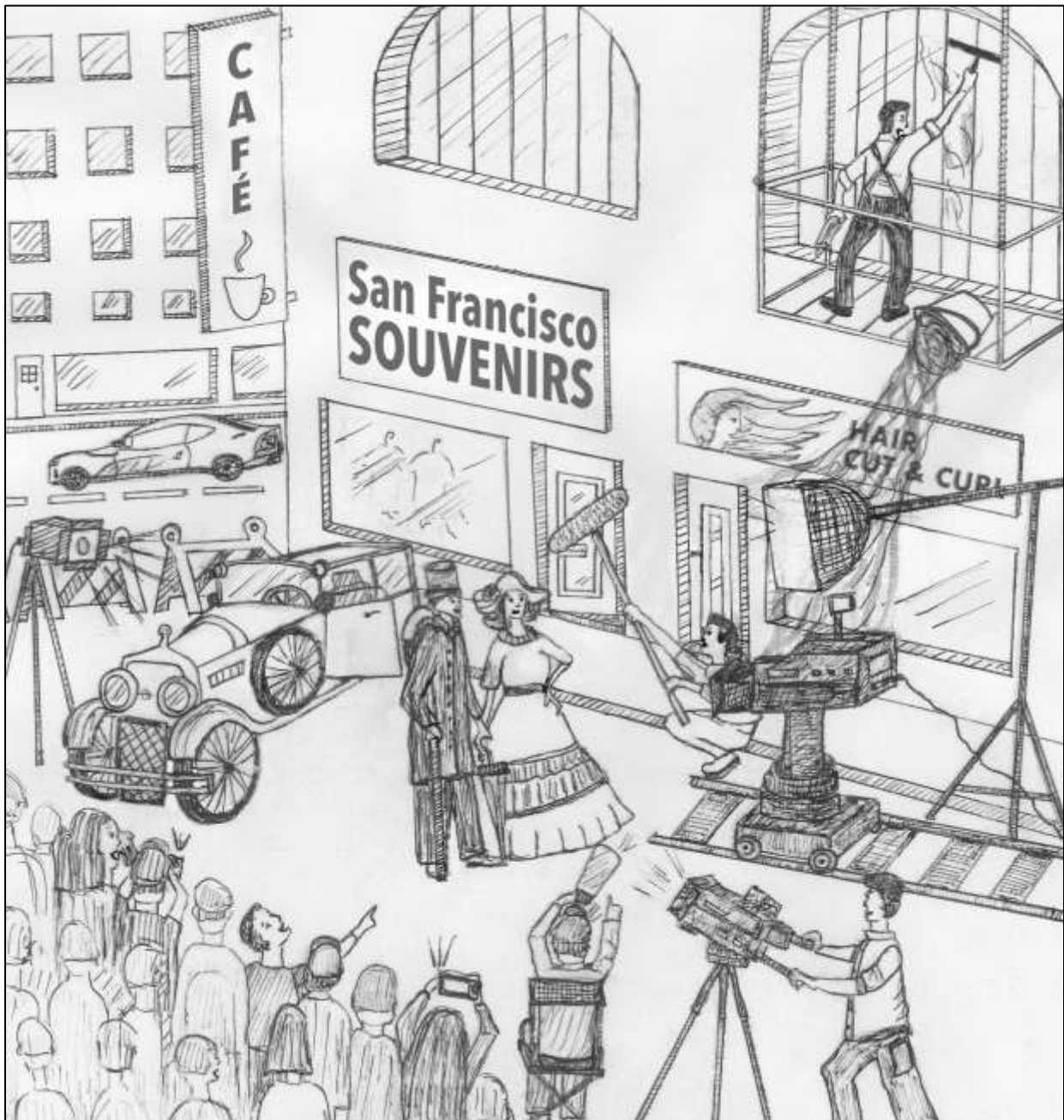
